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THE RISE OF THE B-CORP

For decades, the prevailing doctrine of the corporate world, famously championed by economist Milton Friedman, was that the sole social responsibility of a business is to increase its profits. This shareholder-first paradigm has driven immense economic growth but has also been criticised for fostering inequality and environmental degradation. Challenging this orthodoxy is the rise of the Benefit Corporation, or B-Corp, a new model of business that seeks to redefine success by balancing purpose with profit. The B-Corp movement represents a significant shift, embedding social and environmental impact into a company's legal DNA, yet its potential to scale into a mainstream solution for a more equitable economy is a complex question marked by both compelling benefits and formidable challenges.

A Benefit Corporation is fundamentally different from a traditional C-Corp in its legal structure and fiduciary duty. While a traditional corporation is legally obligated to prioritise the financial interests of its shareholders, a B-Corp expands this responsibility to include all stakeholders: workers, customers, the community, and the environment. This legal framework empowers directors to make decisions that may not maximise immediate profit but serve a greater long-term purpose, such as paying a living wage or sourcing sustainable materials, without fear of shareholder lawsuits. To further validate their commitment, many of these companies pursue B-Corp Certification from the non-profit B Lab, a rigorous process that measures a company's entire social and environmental performance. This certification provides a transparent, third-party seal of approval, signalling to consumers and investors that the company is not just talking the talk, but walking the walk.



The benefits of adopting the B-Corp model are increasingly tangible. In a competitive talent market, certification acts as a powerful magnet for purpose-driven employees, particularly among younger generations who seek more than just a paycheck. Similarly, it builds deep brand loyalty and consumer trust, as a growing segment of the market makes purchasing decisions based on corporate values. Furthermore, the rise of impact investing has opened new channels of capital from investors who are looking to generate both financial returns and positive, measurable impact. By institutionalising a long-term, stakeholder-oriented view, B-Corps may also build greater resilience against market volatility and reputational risks, proving that doing good can be good for business.

However, the path to becoming a B-Corp is not without its challenges, and its scalability remains a subject of debate. The certification process itself can be costly and time-consuming, creating a barrier for small businesses with limited resources. More fundamentally, B-Corps must constantly navigate the inherent tension between mission and margin. A decision to invest in eco-friendly packaging or offer generous employee benefits can strain the bottom line, creating difficult trade-offs that traditional corporations can more easily avoid. This tension raises the critical question of scalability: Can the B-Corp model thrive in the high-pressure environment of public markets, where the demand for quarterly growth is relentless? While the movement is gaining momentum, it risks remaining a niche for mission-driven private companies unless it can fundamentally alter the broader expectations of the global financial system.

THE BUTTERFLY'S HIDDEN "ARMOUR"

When you look at a butterfly, you see vibrant colors and delicate grace. But have you ever looked closer—microscopically closer?

Did you really know that a butterfly's wings are not actually painted with pigments? Instead, they are covered in thousands of tiny, overlapping scales, much like the shingles on a roof. While some scales do contain pigment, many of the most brilliant blues and greens you see are "structural colors." These scales are shaped like microscopic canyons that reflect light in a way that creates intense, shimmering hues that never fade.

Even more surprising: these scales are water-repellent (hydrophobic). They allow the butterfly to stay dry in a rainstorm by causing water droplets to roll off instantly, carrying dirt and dust with them. Without this "self-cleaning" armor, a single raindrop could be heavy enough to grounded the insect forever.





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Ingredients

- 500 g of Beef fillet, cut into big chunks of pcs or Nihari Meat
- 1/2 cup oil
- 3 TBSP ginger garlic paste
- 1 Tbsp Salt
- 1 Cube - Beef Stock/Chicken Stock
- 2-3 TBSP Shan Masala Powder Paste

Beef NIHARI

In a Pan on medium-low heat, add the oil followed by your meat. Once the meat changes colour, add Ginger Garlic paste and mix till the paste releases its aroma.

Add your stock Cube.

Next, add 2-3TBSP of Shan Masala Powder and make it into a Paste by mixing water and mixing well.

Leave it to boil till the oil separates.

Nihari Masala

- 1/2 Cup Oil
- 3 TBSP GG Paste
- 1 TBSP Kashmiri Chilly Powder
- 1/2 TBSP Red Chilli powder
- 1 TSP Jeera Powder
- 1 Tsp Dried Mango Powder
- 1/2 Tsp Turmeric Powder
- 1/4- 1/2 Packet Shan Nihari Masala (Its spicy so add with caution)
- 1/2 Cup Yoghurt
- Water as required

In a pan , add oil followed by GG Paste. Let the past fry for about 30-40 Secs. Thereafter add all the spices as mentioned except yoghurt. Add a little water if the paste is too thick. Once all the masalas have cooked well add yoghurt mix well .Add water if required. Once the oil starts to float add this mixture to the meat.

To get the best out of your nihari. Transfer the nihari pot to a slow heat place such as charcoal with very low heat. Leave the pot to simmer on low heat occasionally adding water as required till the meat is soft and breaks with a wooden spoon. If using bone meat till the meat falls off the bone easily.



Once you achieve that consistency, bring the pot back to the stove. Remove all the excess oil that's floating on top.

Next, add Flour slurry and mix well. Add water if needed and let this cook well. Now switch off the stove and coriander leaves for garnish.

When serving the Nihari. Add the Nihari to the bowl. Pour the oil (warmed)removed earlier as required on top of the Nihari.

Garnish or serve on the side with Fried onions, green chillies , Ginger pieces and Lemon Wedges.

Serve with Ajam , rice , Naan or Fried Paratha.

Republic Day is one of India's three most important national holidays, celebrated with immense patriotism and grandeur. Historical Significance

After India gained independence from British rule on August 15, 1947, it did not yet have a permanent constitution. The nation was functioning under the laws of the colonial Government of India Act, 1935. A drafting committee, chaired by the brilliant jurist Dr. B.R. Ambedkar, was appointed to create a sovereign blueprint for the nation.

The Constituent Assembly spent nearly three years debating and finalizing the document. The constitution was adopted on November 26, 1949 (now celebrated as Constitution Day), but its implementation was deliberately set for January 26. This date was chosen for its symbolic power: it was on this day in 1930 that the Indian National Congress had first declared "Purna Swaraj" (complete independence) from British rule. Thus, January 26 links the establishment of the republic with the earliest aspirations of the freedom movement.

When the constitution was enacted in 1950, India officially transformed from a British Dominion into a Sovereign, Socialist, Secular, and Democratic Republic, with Dr. Rajendra Prasad sworn in as its first President.

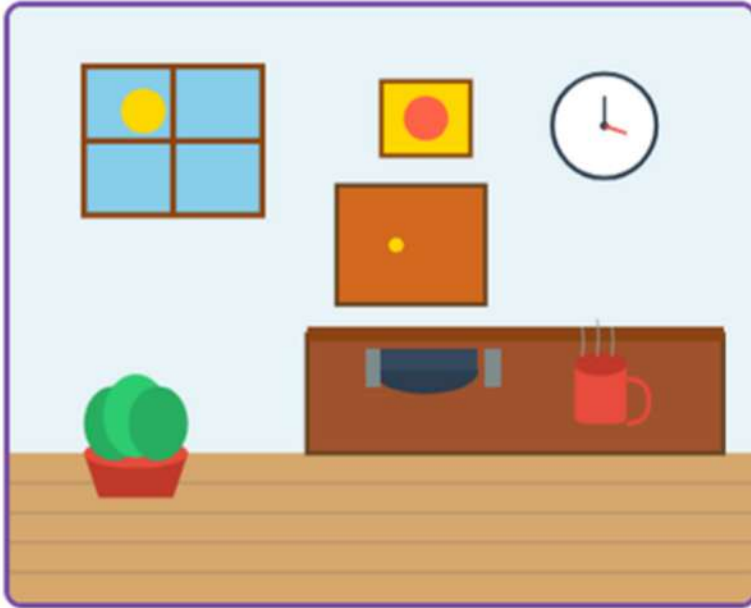
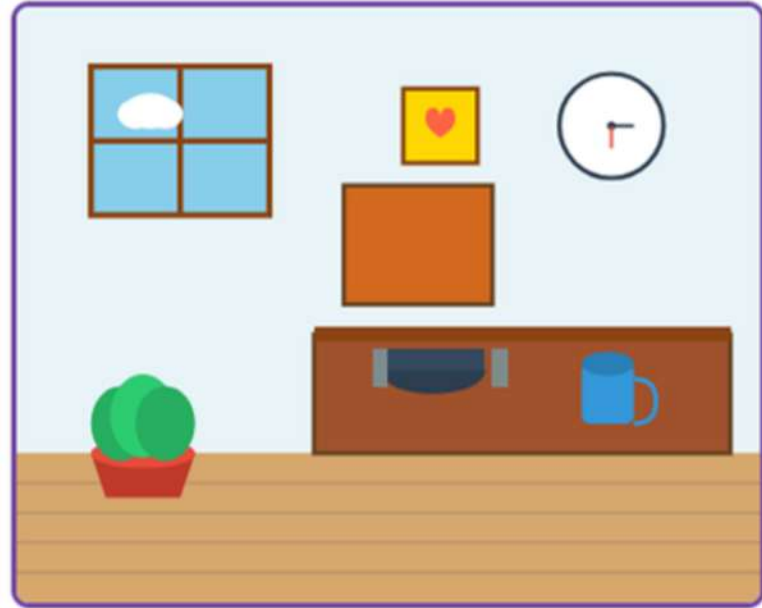

Describe yourself in a few words.

I am a purpose-driven changemaker who operates at the intersection of power, technology, and public impact. My core work has been in the translation of complex policy and municipal strategies into tangible, actionable outcomes that truly serve citizens. As someone from a low-income background, I am incredibly passionate about reducing the power gap. This means ensuring that technology and governance systems are contextualised for Africa, work for the most vulnerable, and are driven by African ubuntuism, not just imported solutions. My passion is to create a more equitable and effective future for the people who often lack a voice in the systems meant to serve them.

Can you walk us through your career journey and how you've ended up in your current role?

My career trajectory reflects a commitment to building institutional capacity rather than delivering one-off interventions. From mentoring graduate research assistants early in my career to creating "train-the-trainer" programs for vaccine champions during COVID-19 to establishing Communities of Practice for municipal officials, I consistently design for sustainability and local ownership. My work is driven by the belief that policies and solutions must be designed for African cities specifically, moving beyond imported models to create frameworks that work within our political economies and institutional realities.

I am a public sector strategist who has spent the past eight years translating complex policy challenges into actionable solutions that directly improve lives in the country's most vulnerable communities. My career began with a UNICEF road safety initiative, where I helped conduct comprehensive research on child road injuries, securing critical datasets and creating evidence-based advocacy materials used to engage ministerial leadership. During the pandemic, I pivoted to frontline COVID-19 response work in disadvantaged communities, where I led interventions that secured over \$20,000 in government funding for 52 community food gardens, addressing both economic collapse and food insecurity when school feeding programs ceased.

My expertise lies in making data and digital transformation work in low-resource, politically complex environments where traditional consulting approaches fail. At a civic technology organisation, I evolved from project contributor to grant manager for a £1 million donor-funded program spanning multiple municipalities. I led the development of data strategies for major metros and secondary cities, authored my organisation's flagship Data Strategy Toolkit, now used as the organisational template, and pioneered a tiered advisory model that has enabled municipalities across the province to begin their journey towards unlocking data for better decisions. My work consistently involves reframing problems and building the political coalitions necessary to move from strategy documents to systemic change.



How do you think city departments can use data to improve service delivery? Can you give an example from your experience?

I believe data can transform service delivery, but only if we first address three institutional-level barriers. First, cities need to procure systems that actually work for the people using them, and that starts with engaging users before procurement, not after. You'd be surprised what you learn when you ask frontline staff, the ones that engage with residents, what they actually need. Second, we need systems that enable interoperability. Currently, different departments use different systems that can't talk to each other, creating data silos that make it impossible to see the full picture of service delivery challenges. Procurement is varied because departments often work in silos; they are trying to meet their Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) and, unintentionally, build their own kingdoms in the process. Third, cities need clear guidelines and ways of working around data access. Right now, data access is often controlled by individual egos rather than institutional processes, which means critical information sits locked away when it should be informing decisions.

A concrete example: We worked with a major metro to address its service delivery challenge. Every week, the municipal service delivery team would meet to discuss issues, but they had no way to prioritise effectively. They didn't know which issues were resolved, and each department was using its own system. Essentially, pitted against each other. We brought crucial stakeholders together and created a process map to understand the "as is" versus the "to be" state. Rather than waiting for perfect data from all sources, we prioritised building a dashboard using a single source that had 55% of the data, enough to start making better decisions. We then created an automated data pipeline that cleaned and updated the dashboard continuously. The dashboard also made visible which areas had been historically under-resourced, creating transparency that enabled more equitable service allocation. My key learning was that don't let perfect be the enemy of good. Start with the data you have, make it accessible and actionable, then build from there.

Can you tell us about a time when you had to engage with stakeholders from different backgrounds? How did you approach the situation?

A municipal data strategy project required me to navigate one of the most complex stakeholder environments I've encountered. I had to bring together municipal officials from different departments with varying levels of data literacy, technical capacity, and institutional priorities, all while working in a politically volatile environment where leadership changed frequently, and our primary champions kept leaving their positions.

The stakeholder landscape included frontline department officials who understood service delivery challenges intimately but had limited technical data knowledge. The senior leadership who cared about strategic positioning and council approval. The IT and technical staff who worried about data security and system constraints, and various departmental heads who saw data governance as potentially creating more bureaucracy rather than solving problems.



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Tailgating, also known as tailgating driving or "bumper-to-bumper" driving, is the dangerous practice of following another vehicle too closely. Understanding the causes and consequences of tailgating is crucial for promoting safer driving habits and improving overall traffic safety in cities.

Understanding Tailgating



01. Maintain a Safe Following Distance

Use the two- or three-second rule by picking a fixed point on the road and ensuring you pass it at least two to three seconds after the car ahead. Increase the distance in poor weather or heavy traffic.

02. Stay Patient and Courteous

Avoid reacting impulsively to tailgaters or traffic, and do not engage in aggressive behaviour like brake-checking.

03. Keep a Steady Speed

Do not speed up or slow down abruptly to react to tailgaters; maintain a consistent, safe speed.

04. Anticipate Traffic Flow

Watch brake lights and be aware of traffic patterns to avoid sudden stopping or last-minute lane changes.

05. Use Cruise Control When Appropriate

On highways or steady roads, cruise control helps maintain a consistent distance and speed.

06. Change Lanes Safely When Possible

If someone is tailgating you, safely move to another lane to let them pass if conditions allow.

AN IMPORTANT DAY 27 FEBRUARY

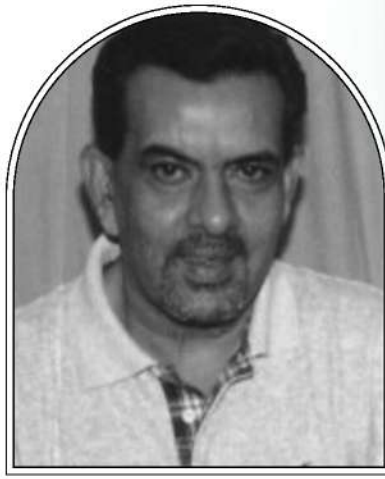
On February 27, 1915, the British ocean liner RMS Lusitania was sunk by a German U-boat off the coast of Ireland during World War I. The Lusitania was one of the largest and fastest passenger ships of its time, and its sinking resulted in the loss of 1,198 lives, including many civilians and American citizens.

The sinking of the Lusitania was a pivotal event in World War I. Germany had declared unrestricted submarine warfare, aiming to blockade Britain by sinking ships in the Atlantic. The attack on the Lusitania shocked the international community because it was a civilian vessel, and the loss of lives, especially those of civilians, stirred outrage, particularly in the United States. This event contributed to increasing anti-German sentiment and eventually influenced the U.S. decision to join the war in 1917..

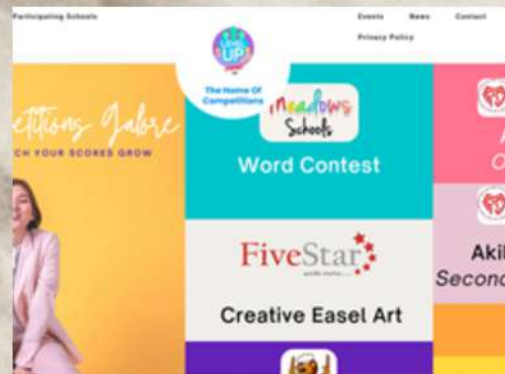

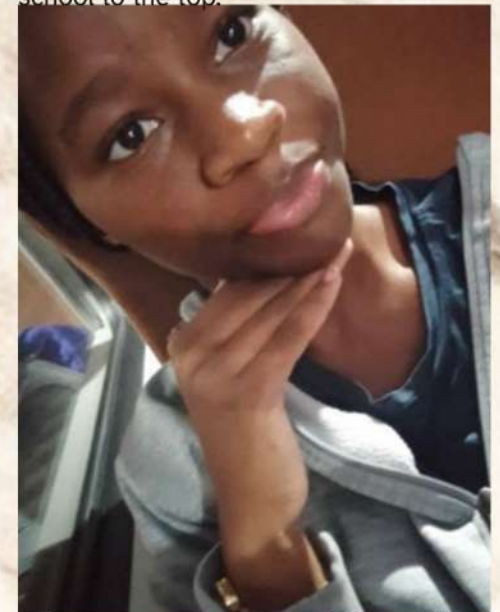

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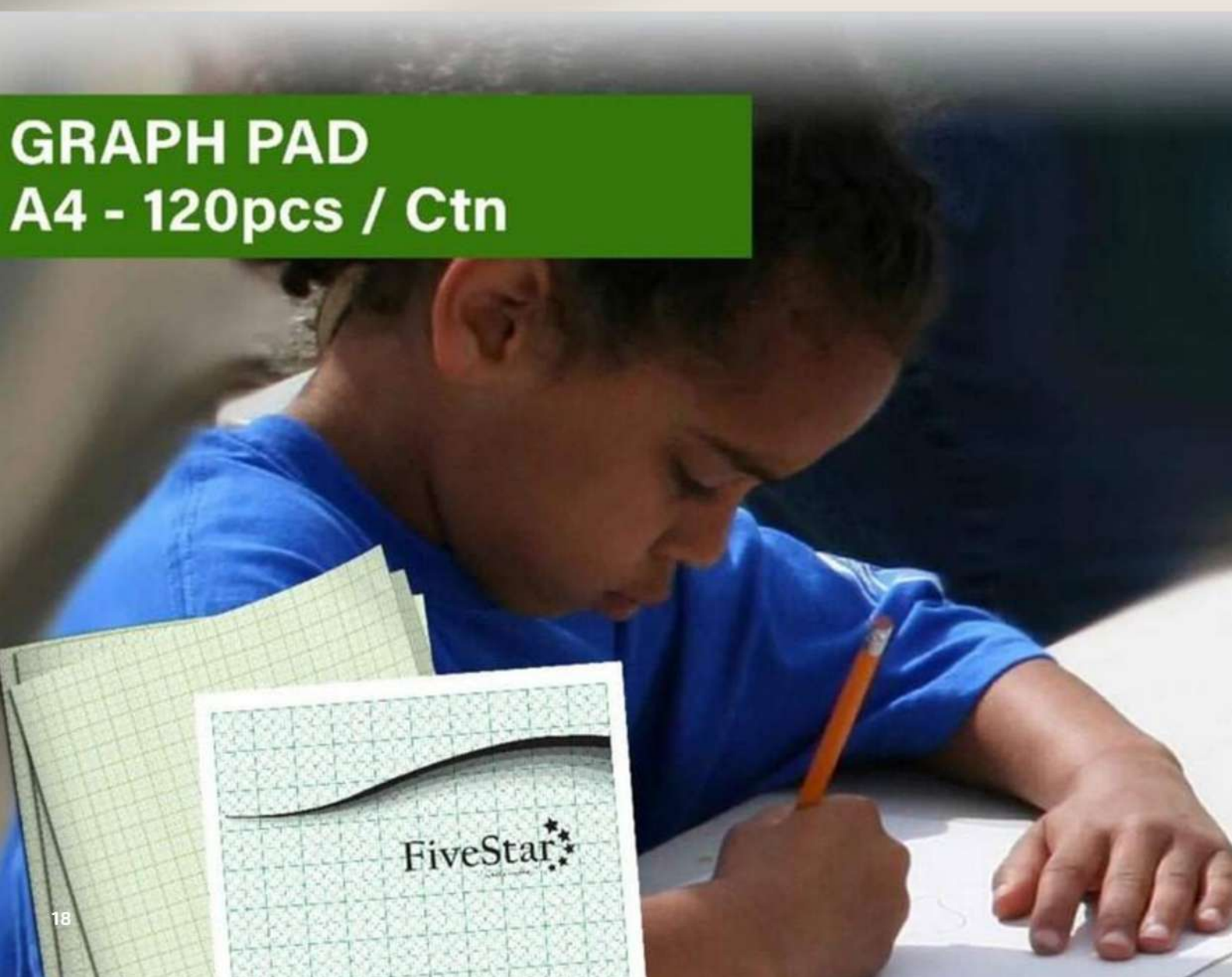


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
